The language of sculpture is the language of embodied space. Freed from a dedication to the wall, the space between art works becomes crucial to their framing, and as such, implicates the physical energy of the viewer more than any other art form. Indeed, the phenomenological implications of this sculpted viewership became crucial to the introduction of the body itself, gendered or otherwise, as a site for art working. This is a multilingual task, as the language of mind and body are distinct more often than not. Through its year-long series of two-person exhibitions, / has become a place dedicated to the language of space as it exists between artworks. Here, we take the opportunity to expand this concern through the airy quality of the summer group show.

Natani Notah's work appropriates the device of the assisted ready-made to develop a narrative that implicates not just her own body, but also the cultural body of a people written throughout history as other by others. Mitzi Pederson on the other hand largely eschews narrative, opting, instead, for a subtle manipulation of found material that favors abstraction and eludes an attempt at story, or , perhaps, a need for words at all. Meanwhile, body and language are made explicit in Lisa Williamson's work, as sculptures that resonate with the ontological weight and proportion of the human form converse with the aestheticized epistemology of the artist book. Finally, Brenna Youngblood strips the semiotic materiality of language and identity down to its essentials, as the linguistic becomes formal in her rigorous conceptual play of the typographic and the abstract. In each case, these artists exhibit a concern for the language space between objects and bodies as a means of understanding and articulating the terms themselves.

Natani Notah was born in San Bernardino, California and currently lives and works in the San Francisco Bay Area. Her work has been exhibited at galleries and institutions including The Holland Project, Reno, Edwin Zoller Gallery, Penn State University, Mana Contemporary, Chicago, Stanford University Art Gallery, and Root Division, San Francisco. She has been published in As/Us: A Space for Women of the World, Yellow Medicine Review: A Journal of Indigenous Literature, Art and Thought, Sculpture Magazine, and is forthcoming in the second edition of Colonize This! Young Women of Color on Today's Feminism. She is the recipient of the 2018-2019 Headlands Center for the Arts Graduate Fellowship.

Mitzi Pederson was born in Stuart, Florida, and currently lives and works in San Francisco. Her work has been exhibited at galleries and institutions including Ratio 3, San Francisco, Nicole Klagsbrun, New York, White Columns, New York, World Class Boxing, Miami, The Approach, London, Fused Space, San Francisco, White Flag Projects, St. Louis, the Hammer Museum, Los Angeles, San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, New Langton Arts, San Francisco, the Atlanta Contemporary Art Center, Oakland Museum of California, The Aspen Art Museum, The Scottsdale Museum of Contemporary Art, The University of California Berkeley Art Museum and Pacific Film Archive, and The MCA, Chicago. Her work was included in the 2008 Whitney Biennial.

Lisa Williamson was born in Chicago, Illinois, and currently lives and works in Los Angeles. She has exhibited at galleries and institutions including LA><ART, West Hollywood, Tif Sigfrids, Los Angeles, The Finley, Los Angeles, The Box, Los Angeles, Marianne Boesky Gallery, New York, Los Angeles County Museum of Art, Los Angeles, the Hammer Museum, Los Angeles, and CCA Andratx Kunsthalle, Mallorca. Her work was included in the 2010 California Biennial at The Orange County Museum of Art, Newport Beach and in the 2012 edition of Made in L.A. at the Hammer Museum, Los Angeles.

Brenna Youngblood was born in Riverside, California and currently lives and
